The 2017 FFA Cup (now the Australian Cup) was the fourth edition of the tournament, and up until that point, South hadn't really made a splash. South had only managed to qualify once for the tournament's final stages (in 2015), but in that campaign, they were knocked out immediately by Palm Beach in the round of 32.

2017 however saw a far more successful campaign. Firstly, South had qualified in style, defeating Eastern Lions 2-0, Monbulk Rangers 4-0, and Box Hill United 2-1 before facing Dandenong City in the final qualification round.

In that game South were down 4-1 with just 10 minutes to go - but Lujic scored a brace and Daley equalised late in the game. At the 97<sup>th</sup> minute, Lujic scored a penalty to complete the famous comeback!

In the FFA Cup Round of 32, South defeated Edgeworth 1-0. In the Round of 16, South defeated Sorrento 4-1. In the quarter final, South defeated Gold Coast City 6-0 – enacting revenge for 2015 (noting Gold Coast City were renamed from Palm Beach).

In the Semi Final, South faced Sydney FC at Lakeside. The match was played in torrential rain with nearly 6,000 fans in the stands. Unfortunately, Sydney was too good on the night and won 5-1, they would later go on to be that season's A-League Champions.

Overall, it was a memorable campaign. South scored 25 goals in 8 games, made the Semi Finals, and enjoyed the national spotlight.

## **Grand Prix Promotions**



Ferenc Puskas is one of Football's most decorated players. He played a World Cup Final, is a Real Madrid Legend and the FIFA award for the year's most beautiful goal is named after him - he also coached South Melbourne!

Ange and the Boss tells the story of Ferenc Puskas and his time in Australia through interviews with former South Melbourne players, and Puskas' closest Australian friends. With each interview the documentary reveals Puskas' larger than life character, and uncovers some absolutely hilarious stories.

Among those stories are the time Puskas ate a whole team dinner by himself at Marconi, silenced a Middle Park crowd with some offensive Greek gestures, and how he tutored a young Ange Postecoglou whilst simultaneously coaching South Melbourne to the 1991 Championship.

We are lucky to have this film which was years in the making and faced countless issues relating to funding and licencing. It was only thanks to community donations that the film received the licence to be shown at festivals. Thankfully, these successful festival screenings helped secure funding for a national release just six months later.

The film makers Tony Wilson, Cam Fink and Rob Heath are not soccer fans. They stumbled onto this story by accident and deserve credit for recognising its importance and persevering to get this film made.



Thankfully their efforts have been rewarded with great responses from audiences and critics. At the sold-out screening we attended the audience laughed, cried, and gave the film a standing ovation.

Multiculturalism, 90s football, South Melbourne glory days, and the graceful Puskas himself make this film must watch viewing for all South fans. If you haven't already, watch it!

### Women's team update

We already find ourselves three games into the seasons and there's been plenty to talk about regarding the women's team.

In off-field news the club signed goalkeeper Ayana Aoyagi who comes to the club after stints in Japan, the USA and previously Calder United here in Victoria. The club also announced the women's leadership group, led by Francesca Iermano as captain. Iermano is in her 5<sup>th</sup> season at the club and also has experience at A-League Women level.



In on-field news the season kicked off at Kingston Heath against Bentleigh Greens. A goal from Olivia Bomford helped secure a 1-1 draw in an entertaining game.

In round 2 the team faced the FV Academy at Lakeside for their first home match of the season. Although the first half ended 2-2, South dominated the second half, and finished the game 7-2 winner. The result was also the first official win for the team's new coach Matt Shepherd.

#### Quintas has time

Esteban Quintas is the name on everyone's lips, but not necessarily for the right reasons. Three lost Grand Finals, a recent string of poor results, and an unattractive football style has put pressure on the South head coach. But let's pause for a second. It's a long season and two poor months is not the end of the world.

First, a little bit of context. In 2017 South came 2<sup>nd</sup>, then Chris Taylor left the club, and then in 2018 South came 10<sup>th</sup>, avoiding the relegation play-off position by just two points. Midway through 2019, Esteban Quintas came in as head coach and things started to turn around.

The 2020 and 2021 seasons were cancelled early due to COVID lockdowns but every year since, South has found itself near the top of the table. We cannot understate how bad things were in 2018. On a results basis, there is no other way to say this - Esteban Quintas restored the club's status as a power house of Victorian football and even brought the club national acclaim by guiding it to the Australia Cup Semi-Finals.

Of course there is more to the story. Despite good results and silverware (2x Premierships and a Dockerty Cup) many fans have not been won over by the coach. This is in part due to three consecutive Grand Final losses (including a 5-0 loss to Oakleigh and a 4-0 loss to Avondale) and by the team's unattractive playing style.

In recent years South have been playing direct football with a focus on set plays and long throws. It can be hard to watch when we're winning, but it's worse to watch when we are losing. Couple this with our recent poor form, and some fans have had enough.



However, we must counter with a point. This season will be 11 months long, and we have only seen a handful of poor results. Quintas has plenty of time to change things up. He was awarded the 2024 coach of the year for a reason, let's hope he can turn things around and deliver a more attractive playing style, an improvement in form and eventually a Grand Final victory.
