South missed out on the national rounds of the inaugural FFA Cup, so in 2015 the club made it a priority to return to the national stage.

In the preliminary rounds, South defeated Whittlesea United 5-0, who had on their side former South player Tansel Baser.

In the next round South defeated North Sunshine 8-0 - it's worth noting that at the time North Sunshine were playing in State League 1 North West. In the final preliminary round South faced Melbourne Knights, the team who knocked South out of the cup in 2014.

A large crowd came to Lakeside to watch that game and yet... the Knights scored first! However, Milos Lujic pulled one back from the penalty spot and Epifano gave us the lead with a memorable longrange goal. South then scored a third to seal the win and qualify for the national rounds.



South were now competing in national competition for the first time in over a decade, and their opponent was Palm Beach. The game was played on the Gold Coast, and South played in a unique white kit featuring a red chevron.

South took the lead early, but a mistake from Roganovic led to a penalty which allowed Palm Beach to equalise. Palm Beach would go onto to win the game in a penalty shootout - but overall South's FFA Cup campaign was a success, as it saw the club finally reach the national stage again.

# Home ground headaches

South is extremely fortunate to play at Albert Park. It is beautiful and central, but it is also busy. There are dozens of clubs who occupy the park, and to make things worse, each year we all lose park access thanks to the Grand Prix.

At Lakeside Stadium, the Senior team has to manage its access around Athletics, who also share the ground. As a result the Seniors train in the mornings, and are sometimes forced to play games on Monday nights. The juniors however, have more challenging arrangements at their Albert Park 'home'.

In 2025 our Junior teams will play home games at Warner Reserve in Springvale, Princess Park in Caufield, and Grange Reserve, in Clayton. Even training sessions for the juniors teams are forced to move! This year the club posted pictures showing our girls training at the Darebin International Sports Centre!

All this is to say that South Melbourne have a facility problem. The club is relying on shorter term agreements and this is not how the club should be operating! Consistent, predictable and facilities home permanent contribute to club culture and will solve many of the issues fans often ask or complain about.

Why don't we use the Social club more? Because our juniors and their parents aren't training or playing anywhere near it!

Why don't we have more juniors come to our games? Because they are likely playing a 'home' game that weekend half an hour away!



South currently have year-round access to Paul Wade Field (shared with other sports), Allan Davidson Field (exclusive), and Ange Postecoglou Field (exclusive). The club also has winter access to Oval 13. If this still isn't enough than fans need to understand why! Longer-term arrangements need to be secured by the board as a priority!

### Mergers

Most fans know that South Melbourne FC was established in 1959, but fewer have details about the mergers that formed the club.

#### Clubs

1959 actually marks the year that two clubs merged to form 'Hellas'. These two clubs were 'Hellenic' and 'Yarra Park'. Both of these clubs were backed by the Greek community and their merger resulted in a single large supporter base.

The following year 'Hellas' merged with 'South Melbourne United' to form South Melbourne Hellas. This provided South Melbourne Hellas with access to Middle Park where the club is still based today.

So, although 1959 marks the establishment of 'Hellas', some could argue that South Melbourne FC only really started in 1960!



#### Colours

Another strange dynamic of the mergers is the colour of the clubs involved. Yarra Park supposedly played In Yellow and Black. Hellenic supposedly played in Blue and White. South Melbourne United used to play in White and Red – in the same combination as the Australian Rules Football team.

Although there is no trace left of Yarra Park's Yellow and Black, South have on occasion worn the Red and White combination, most recently during the club's 2015 FFA Cup campaign.

#### More Mergers?

There is one more club that can trace its lineage through South Melbourne. Melbourne Hakoah once share Middle Park with South Melbourne FC, but in the early 80s the club dissolved and its team was absorbed into South Melbourne's reserves.

Going further back one can find teams playing under the South Melbourne name as far back as the 1800s – however none of them have any connection to today's South.

### Junior Boys Teams Update

South operate a comprehensive junior program covering Miniroos (U 8's to U 13's), girls teams and six teams at the Junior Boys NPL Levels.

Now that we are a third of the way though the season, we figured it was a good chance to see how our Junior Boys programs is going.

The Junior Boys football department operates under the guidance of Tass Roufos (Football Director) and Rinichi Mikami (Technical director).

At this stage of the season the youth boys competitions typically comprise of tables with 12 teams. Generally, South's teams are doing well and mostly find themselves in the top half of their tables with a couple of the teams pushing for top spot, namely the Under 19's and the Under 15's.



Under 23's

Last season the Under 23's frequently saw their players promoted to the Senior team, so their performance is important to track as a signal of the Senior squad's depth.

This year the squad has seen mixed performances with six points in the last five games. The competition is tight with South only three points away from top spot.

Toby Simeoni has been the top scorer of the team with three goals in six games followed by Andre Skapoulas with two goals in two games.

# Why are we copping so many goals?

South Melbourne have only enjoyed two clean sheets this season. They were against 14<sup>th</sup> placed Port Melbourne, and 13<sup>th</sup> placed Altona Magic. Outside of those matches, South have conceded 2 goals per game. Why is the defence so poor this year?

#### Is it the Goalkeeper?

No - if anything, Javier Lopez has minimised the damage with a number of saves this year. Although there have been goalkeeping errors this season (Lopez was off his line against Dandenong, and Pithoulas conceded an unfortunate penalty against Preston), South's defensive issues appear to be further up the field.



#### Is it the Defence?

South has conceded 4 goals in first halves, and 10 goals in second halves this season. Our defensive issues are later in games, but why?

During games this season South is facing far more shots that it is creating, and it is struggling to maintain possession. This creates asymmetric pressure which leaves our defence more worn down than that of our opponents.

The result? 5 goals conceded after the 80<sup>th</sup> minute, and an unnecessary 90<sup>th</sup> minute red card for Jankovic. Our defence is getting fatigued – but also frustrated by facing constant pressure.

Why is there so much pressure?

Our opposition this year has dominated possession in midfield (leading to more open shots), and has often been able to play through the centre unimpeded (leading to counter attacks).

Even on the ball, our lack of midfield options is forcing our team into direct plays which results in turnovers. This leaves our team unable to rest on our own terms and burning out.

If we want to cop less goals, we need the midfield get organised!
